What is ACC?



The Association for Community Colleges (ACC) is a European non-governmental non-profit organisation founded mainly by young Europeans.

ACC currently has around 500 individual members from 35 European states. We work for the development of a European public sphere.

The main idea of ACC is that a unique way of promoting this objective would be through establishing residential **community colleges** on a common European level.

ACC organises events and courses for mixed groups of Europeans, let participants learn and live together for a longer period of time, in order to demonstrate how to develop a common trans-national political identity.

ACC liaises authorities to promote the idea of creating and running common European community colleges.

ACC is active all over Europe, in 2004-5 focusing on Community College Courses in Trieste/Pliskovica (I/SLO), Jekabpils (LV), Århus (DK), Reggello (I), Rhodes (GR), Cornwall (UK), and Berlin (GE)

Our Innovative Project: FECC

The First European Community College (FECC) is an initiative that follows up naturally on the activities and initiatives of the Association for Community Colleges.

During recent years, ACC has proved the viability of the concept and the popularity among European youngsters of gathering in the projects that fall within the definition of European Community Colleges.

The idea of founding and developing of a First European Community Colleges is inspired by the Nordic concept of Folk High Schools, the format of Grundtvigian residential colleges.

We offer for the European community a European Citizenship Education.

FECC objectives:

- To give all Europeans a forum for learning and living together.
- · To create a sense of shared responsibility for Europe and the world, while maintaining diversity.
- To take concrete action on the background of recommendations from the Nice-protocols, the EU whitepapers on youth policy and European governance, the EU-Enlargement process, and the ambitions to create a European participatory democracy.
- To create active European citizenship experiences.
- To develop skills and competences for the European job market.
- To develop competences for living in a multicultural Europe.
- . To be a forum for the (future) network of Europeans with common values based on European histories, cultures and politics.
- · To develop schools "governed by culture" in so far as daily life at the individual school is influenced by local traditions and culture.

Current ACC Courses

The past years the Association for Community Colleges has carried out residential school courses at many locations throughout Europe. The teams behind the courses are the building bricks of our First European Community College.

The themes of the courses have varied and comprise:

- The EU-Enlargement
- European national minorities
- The EU-Constitution-Treaty
- Mobility on the labour market
- Education and Training
- Rural Development
- European Periodicals and Media
- Human Rights
- Alternative Learning Methods
- And many more are coming up....

Despite the variety the unifying concepts are always the same:

- European issues on the course agenda
- · Debate among Europeans instead of among countrymen
- Meetings follow the residential format of European Community Colleges
- Courses result in a concrete outcome (e.g. TV productions, print/web publications, etc.) contributing to the European public sphere.

A more permanent and physical course frame would mean a chance for many more people to participate.

The duration of the courses is also important; the longer they are, the closer and more intense the experience you get.

A First European Community College will clarify both what the courses offer and what the outcome will be for you.
